
BEAR AWARE

MANAGE YOUR ATTRACTANTS

If you manage the bear attractants around your house or worksite you can keep your family safe and keep bears from being destroyed. There are a number of things you can do:

1. **Keep all garbage securely stored** until collection day. Placing garbage at the curb before collection day is poor behavior and often illegal.
2. **Manage your fruit trees and berry bushes** responsibly. Pick all fruit as it ripens and ensure that windfalls do not accumulate.
3. **Bird feeders often become bear-feeders**, so please only feed birds during the winter months.
4. **Feed pets indoors**, or if fed out of doors, take in any feed that is not immediately eaten.
5. **Keep your barbecue clean** and free from odours. Burn off the grill every time after use and clean out the grease traps.
6. **Manage your compost properly.** Composts should have equal amounts of brown and green materials added to reduce odours.



Bears have a sense of smell far greater than that of dogs and it is this sense of smell that helps them locate food at great distances.

COMMUNITY HEALTH WELLNESS & AQUATIC CENTRE

The Town has engaged the services of VDA Architecture to help us formalize a vision, concept plans and budget for the Proposed Health, Wellness & Aquatic Centre.

The study has involved research, and discussions with the aquatic centre feasibility working group, recreation personnel and Council so that we could be sure that the plan would be sensitive to the needs of the community.

The aquatic centre feasibility working group comprised of community members from the Senior Citizens Branch, Princeton Secondary School (student and staff), Kokanee Swim Club, Mayor, Council and staff.

The next stage is to host an open house to present the feasibility study that has been developed over the last year. Due to a number of factors including the change of the Provincial Government and internal capacity issues due to staff working on the fire; the scheduling of an open house will be scheduled after Mayor, Council and staff meet with the Provincial Government at the UBCM in late September.

Updated information will be shared as available.
