WATER & SEWER RATES



At the Regular Meeting of Council on January 16th, 2016, Council adopted the 2017

Water and Sewer Rates. The water rate sees a residential dwelling increase of \$10.07 and a residential dwelling sewer rate increase of \$3.14. Water and Sewer rates are invoiced annually and will be in mail in the next couple of weeks.

Water revenue charges are designed to cover the cost of operations and create a reserve for the replacement of infrastructure.

Sewer revenue charges will be used to upgrade our monitoring (SCADA) system at the sewage lagoon, carried forward from 2016 and we have applied for funding for the deslugging of cell one at the sewage lagoon.

WOOD BURNING STOVE SAFETY TIPS

A wood burning stove that is properly installed and carefully maintained can provide the warmth and comfort you need in winter. Wood burning stoves also provide the perfect heating alternative when there is a power outage. To keep your family both safe and warm this winter, follow a few basic safety tips before you light your fireplace or wood stove.

- Keep a Class A fire extinguisher on hand;
- Don't use gasoline, charcoal starter fluid or other flammable liquids to start your fire;
- Ensure your stove meets WETT (Wood Energy Technology Transfer) safety guidelines; AND
- Ensure your house insurance company is aware you have wood heat.

Maintain the Required Distance between the Stove and Surroundings

During installation of your wood burning stove, you must ensure that it meets the clearance requirements.

Burn only Seasoned, Dry Wood

The best material to burn in a wood burning stove is dry wood that has been seasoned for at least 6 months. This type of wood burns quicker and brighter, thereby reducing the formation of creosote. Creosote is a highly inflammable byproduct of incomplete combustion of firewood, which usually forms in the chimney and can increase the likelihood of fire. Burning unseasoned or wet wood greatly increases creosote formation and must be avoided. Burning paper or trash in the wood burning stove

may seem like a quick way to light a fire, however, this practice is dangerous because these substances are highly combustible and may emanate toxic gases.

Have the Chimney Inspected and Cleaned Every Year

Have a licensed chimney sweep inspect and clean your chimney at least once a year. This maintenance is critical to maintaining the safety of your stove and chimney, because it removes any soot and creosote formation.

Install Smoke Alarms and Carbon Monoxide Detectors

Any home that uses a wood burning stove must have a working smoke alarm and carbon monoxide detector. These devices warn you in times of danger and can save your home and family.





FIRE INSPECTIONS FOR LOCAL BUSINESS
